U.S. DEAL ON ARCTIC

WASHINGTON, April 27.
 The US asked the UN Security Council yesterday to consider international control of bomber flights over the Arctic. The Council will meet on Tuesday to discuss the question.

The US move follows last week's drama in the Security Council when Russia abruptly withdrew a resolution demanding an immediate end to flights of US nuclear bombers towards the Soviet frontiers.

Meanwhile, messages from Moscow say that Russia has drafted pre-summit diplomatic talks.

M. Gromyko yesterday handed four-page memoranda to the three ambassadors, whom he received separately. The envoys met later to exchange views.

Western diplomats said last night that diplomatic talks went ahead on the basis of separate interviews. The German Minister was unlikely to meet in Moscow, as suggested by Russia.

"REJECTION"
 The US State Department said yesterday that the Soviet Union appeared to have rejected Western proposals designed to facilitate a summit meeting.

The Russian Foreign Minister, Gromyko, said the three Western nations in Moscow had not accepted the Soviet Government's proposal for a summit meeting.

"SHOWDOWN"
 The US Secretary of State (Mr. Dulles) had weekend talks at his home with top Government officials.

A State Department spokesman said today that he was carrying forward the continuing review of our disarmament policy.

Families Flee From Cave-in
PERTH, April 27.
 Seven families, including 25 children, were evacuated as thousands of tons of earth collapsed to a depth of 100 ft inside their homes on Golden Mile, shortly after 4 a.m. today.

Huge Cavern
 The families returned at dawn to find a yawning cavern, an estimated 200 ft deep, earth subsided, carrying with it 20 ft trees and a 6-ft. hedge.

Port Adelaide ruckman Marx Kretschmer's elbow had come into contact with Ron Knebone's face as Kretschmer was "shepherding" the Norwood player in the second quarter of Friday's league football match, the Port Adelaide secretary (Mr. A. R. McLean) said last night.

"To substantiate this," Kretschmer said, "I produced a bruised elbow." Mr. McLean said, "Further evidence is given by the fact that none of the umpires saw anything resembling a reportable incident."

Police believe, following an investigation of the bodies last night, that the family was killed by poisonous carbon monoxide fumes from a kerosene stove in the caravan, probably on Saturday morning.

The family was—Kenneth James ("Peter") Feiwings, 25; Margaret Joan Feiwings, 25; Roxanne Joy Feiwings, 19 months; Colleen Feiwings, seven months.
